Summary of Discussion

- Community reserve account showing positive of 200K after reconciling the deficit incurred in 2020 after the onset of COVID-19 pandemic.
- Reserve budget running at 1.2M to ensure the ability to address more significant and irregular expenses.
- Operating at 102% of budgeted income and 98% of the budgeted expense.
- Additional income in 2021 is attributed to the return of additional programming that wasn't forecasted due to constantly changing regulations associated with the ongoing pandemic.
- Hopeful that 2022 continues to allow for the return of additional MCA programming.

IV. COMMUNITY UPDATE

Foundation for Sustainable Urban Communities (FSUC) Report

Presented by Tammy Holloway, Interim FSUC CEO & Board Chairwoman

- FSUC has many areas of focus, including education, <u>be well</u> (health and wellness initiative centered on community outreach), and <u>Northeast Transportation Connections</u> (predecessor to <u>CPUN</u>; providing early support efforts for community infrastructures, such as sidewalks, stop signs, and streetlights).
- These adjacent community programs support the FSUC's five tenants concerning affordable housing, workforce development, healthy living, and education.
- MCA contributes ~1.5M a year to support the FSUC initiatives.
- FSUC primarily works within Central Park and seeks collaboration with neighboring communities on specific projects.
- FSUC recently announced it was taking over the publishing of the <u>Front Porch</u>, a free monthly newspaper covering news, people, places, and events in Northeast Denver.

Brookfield Properties Developer Report

Presented by Forrest Hancock, Director of Development

- We are entering the final phase of Central Park redevelopment throughout the community.
- The final phase of Central Park's 12th and last neighborhood, North End, is underway; the first stage introduced 670 new residences from nine home builders.
- In the North End, three new parks are expected mid-summer, including Spectator Park, Butterfly Park, and North Park.
- <u>Development Progress Map</u> reveals several exciting projects taking shape, including Natural Grocers located on the northwest corner of Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. and Central Park Blvd.
